

AT THE INTERSECTION OF RACE & SPORTS & LAW: A FRIENDS-SPONSORED DISCUSSION

On December 6, at the Takoma Park Community Center, N. Jeremi Duru and E. Ethelbert Miller will discuss a range of provocative issues related to sports in the *We Are Takoma* Humanities Lecture Series. Moderated by Ralph Steinhardt, George Washington University Professor of Law, Duru and Miller will take on topics such as the rights of professional athletes in political activism, historically and today; the NCAA and exploitation of collegiate sports; head trauma in football and soccer and its implications in relation to race.

Jeremi Duru, a Professor of Law at American University (also a graduate of Blair High School), is among the nation's foremost sports law authorities. He has a particular interest in the impact of sports on society, with a principle focus on racial and gender dynamics. He teaches sports law, civil procedure, and employment discrimination. The author of 4d-

ployment discrimination. The author of Advancing the Ball: Race, Reformation, and the Quest for Equal Coaching Opportunity in the NFL, he is also co-author of the field's premier casebooks, Sports Law and Regulation: Cases and Materials (3rd edition) and The Business of Sports Agents (3rd edition). He is a frequent media contributor for numerous outlets, including CNN, BBC, NBC, MSNBC,

Ethelbert Miller received his BA in African American Studies in 1972 from Howard University. A celebrated writer and literary activist, he is the board chair of the Institute for Policy Studies, the progressive multi-issue think tank in Washington, DC, former director of the African American Studies Resource Center at Howard University, and the founder and former chair of the Humanities Council of Washington, DC.

Ethelbert is co-editor of *Poet Lore*, the oldest poetry magazine published in the country. He has been a Fulbright Senior Specialist Program Fellow to Israel in 2004 and 2012. His *Collected Poems* was published in 2016 and most recently, *If*

Developed by local community leaders in 2013, Lunch and Learn is a summer enrichment camp for school-aged children from Takoma Park and Long Branch communities who qualify for Free and Reduced Meals at local schools. Among its activities, the program emphasizes bolstering academic-year retention by focusing on reading comprehension. The Friends donated well over 60 new books - which were quickly snapped up by campers and their parents . Grade-specific reading lists and Summer Quest materials developed by the Library, were distributed while campers were encouraged to continue reading and learning at the Library the rest of the summer and beyond.

Summer reading plays a critical role in helping youth improve reading skills, develop academically, and prepare for a successful school year, while also staving off learning losses associated with the 'summer slide.' The Friends of the Takoma Park Maryland Library (FTPML) places an emphasis on providing Takoma Park youth with opportunities to read throughout the summer .

FTPML sponsors the flagship SummerQuest program, in which library associate Dave Burbank creates an adventure story with embedded reading challenges. This summer, over 150 Takoma Park youth embarked upon the "Once Upon a Time" adventure story, a premise in which SummerQuest participants got the opportunity to get lost in books. As participants completed each reading challenge, they moved along a giant Game Board in the Children's Room in the Library. All participants received a miniature copy of the Game Board, plus a copy of the story, to take home.

While geared toward young readers, SummerQuest was adaptable for teens and adults, who could use the reading chal-

lenges as a guide as well. Among the challenges: "Read a book that shows you how to make or do something, and then make or do it," "Read an award-winning book," and "Read a book about someone different than you."

In addition to sponsoring the SummerQuest program, FTPML kept young readers engaged with the library through a variety of fun reading activities.

Families came together to celebrate the publication of Takoma Park kids author Minh Le's new picture book "Drawn Together!" The book features vivid illustra-

tions from Caldecott Medalist Dan Santat, which demonstrate that the magic of art and storytelling can transcend language and generations.

Dozens of young readers gathered together for a magical evening to celebrate Harry Potter's 20th anniversary of the U.S. publication of "Harry Potter and the Sorcerer's Stone" with wizarding-themed crafts, treats, and costumes. Takoma Park Harry Potter enthusiast

and Piney Branch Elementary student, Ada, was particularly excited to participate in craft projects stating "It was really fun, especially making mandrakes out of modeling clay!"

The Friends of the Takoma Park Maryland Library were thrilled to see so many young readers engaged in library actiities this summer, and we look forward to the next!

near Hiroshima to work on a book about the turmoil in China.


Hazzard moves her characters in and out of seemingly free-standing stories, but "typically reconnects the episodes, sometimes by surprise, to the main narrative," in the words of one critic. In the words of another, "Hazzard's moral refinement occasionally veers toward preciosity, but such lapses are counterbalanced by her bracing conviction that we either build or destroy the world we want to live in with our every word and gesture."

All are welcome to attend the Friends book discussions. Books will be available in the Library.

BIG BOOK CLUB



All proceeds go to support programs at the library – such as Spanish and French Circle Times, Summer Quest, author appearances and book clubs.


Book donations may be dropped at the library. They should be in very good condition and of general interest. If you have more than three cartons, please make an appointment before bringing them in. (301) 891-7259

The programs the Friends have supported over the past year include:


- Storytelling for children in English, Spanish, and French


Spanish & French Circle Times

Spanish Circle Time is led by the energetic Senora Geiza, and takes place twice each Thursday morning: 10:15-10:45 a.m. and 11-11:30 a.m. At each program, Geiza leads the crowd in singing and dancing with Spanish songs that teach basic language concepts.

Madame Marie leads our Petites Chansons/French Circle Time program, which takes place once a month on a Saturday morning at 10:30 a.m. Participants learn simple French words and phrases through singing songs led by Madame Marie. To keep up with the Petites Chansons schedule, we recommend that you register for the program by going to our website, www.takomapark.info/library and clicking on "events." We send out an email prior to each month's program to everyone who is registered.
