wice a year, the Friends of the Takoma Park Maryland Library and many volunteers set up tables on the library grounds—the aim is to sell thousands of used books the library has received from city residents. These sales are a major way of raising money—on average \$3,500 to \$4,000 a year—to support a wide array of library programs, from Spanish Circle Time for pre-school children, to a speaker series for high school seniors and their parents on applying to colleges, to youth and adult book groups, to much much more (see www.ftpml.org).

Book sales by friends of libraries in the metro area are hardly unusual: within a fifty-mile radius, you can find one nearly every Saturday morning. But the Takoma Park Friends sale is of especially high quality. Not only does the library receive large I have seen our twice-yearly sale grow in reputation among an increasingly large group of buyers who are not the ordinary book lovers ...

donations of nearly-new books from the many writers and reviewers who live in the city, but also it gets top-flight fiction and non-fiction from wide-ranging readers who are making space for new books. That's one reason for quality. Another is that unlike most other book sales, the library staff cull the donations to select mostly those books that were published in recent years—they are in the thousands—and are in good condition.

But these are *our* measures of quality—there is another.

From discussions of banned books to poetic reflections on nursery rhymes, the Library is humming with the sounds of programs for children and teens sponsored by the Friends.

Banned Books

With the Friends' support, we purchase multiple copies of each book discussed by our award-winning Banned Books Club for middle schoolers. Each month, we gather to talk about a different book that someone has challenged. Our books range widely; in October, we discussed the first two volumes in a manga series, *Death Note* by Tsugumi Ohba, while in November we'll tackle *Candide* by Voltaire. In December, we'll take a fun break with a read-aloud session of picture books that have been challenged, then in January, we'll focus on a classic, John Steinbeck's *The Grapes of Wrath*.

Kids Poetry Workshop

For kids in grades 3-5, support by the Friends means we can offer a four-program workshop this fall focused on nursery rhymes and led by two

local poets, Elizabeth Rees and Rosanne Singer. Liz and Rosanne, who led our hugely successful, Friends-sponsored *Good Masters!* Sweet Ladies! poetry workshop last year, will help participants unearth the fascinating history behind nursery rhymes, then create their own responses. Perhaps a young poet would like to express the thoughts of Mary's little lamb, or become the farmer's wife ready to cut off the tails of the three blind mice.

This poetry workshop, limited to 10 participants, will take place on four Tuesdays, Nov. 10 and 17, and Dec. 1 and 8. The final evening will include a gala performance of the poetry created by the workshop participants.

For the Smallest Ones

Thanks to the Friends, we can offer Circle Times in both Spanish and French (as well as our Tuesday morning Circle Times in English). Our new Spanish Circle Time teacher, Geiza Keller-Souza, leads a half-hour program for children through age 5 and their grown-ups each Thursday morning at 10:30 a.m.

Our French Circle Time takes place one Saturday a month, from 10:30-11 a.m. Marie Mackler, a native of Belgium, former preschool teacher and doting grandmother, leads a program of rhymes and songs. We apparently have the only area French Circle Time.

Support by the Friends also has allowed us to purchase more books and other supplies for our popular Wednesday morning programs for babies, toddlers and two-year-olds. The programs, which require registration because they are limited to 15 little ones and their grown-ups, are offered in rotation. One month, the Wednesday morning programs are devoted to babies (our "Lapsit" program), the next month, it's time for the "Wonderful Ones," and the third month, it's "Twosies."

Holiday Programs

Other upcoming programs sponsored by the Friends include our traditional Halloween program starring local storyteller Candace Wolf, our annual harvest-time visit by Eaglebear and Friends in November, and our now-yearly holiday gift-making workshop in December.

One of the best deals in Takoma Park is the array of varied programs at the Takoma Park Maryland Library.

Pre-schoolers

The library provides an abundance of programs for pre-schoolers and their caregivers. Every Tuesday morning at 10 and 11 Karen MacPherson presents a dynamic **Circle Time**, filled with stories, songs and games. No wonder one three-year old shouts "Library – zoom zoom!" each week as her mother prepares to bring her to this very active program.

On Thursdays at 10:30am, Geiza Keller-Souza presents the area's only **pre-school program that is entirely in Spanish**. Geiza is from Brazil, and is an educator with many years of experience in working with young children.

Wednesdays feature a series of programs which alternate every month for babies up to 12 months, one-year olds and two-year olds. They help very young children in the development of **reading readiness**, and acquaint parents and care-givers with ways to help sharpen those skills. These popular programs are for limited numbers of children and preregistration is required.

At the once a month **bed-time story hour**, youngsters are invited to wear their pajamas and bring a favorite bedtime animal.

Saturday mornings may feature a French Circle Time with Madame Marie, a Saturday Circle Time with Karen or special events such as our recent "Dia Day" celebration with stories and crafts. Of course there are numerous craft and holiday programs, visits by elementary classes and nursery schools, and special performances by noted storytellers and other performers.

Reading Groups

The Friends support four book clubs including the prize winning **Banned Books Club** for middle schoolers, **Friends Reading Group**, **Great Big Book Club**, and an **on-line book club**.

Services for Adults

Periodic programs in conjunction with **MontgomeryWorks** in Wheaton provide guidance to adults in developing job-related skills such as resume building and interviewing.

Programs for elementary school children include a monthly 'Comix Jam' with our graphic novel expert Dave Burbank – and a special Elmo projector furnished by the Friends, and our multifaceted SummerQuest summer reading program which is also created by Dave.

High school students and their parents attend our popular **College Bound Programs**—featuring advice by nationally known experts on college selection, financial aid and SAT testing.

The Computer Center

The **computer center** is used by community members of all ages and backgrounds who wish to network, find jobs, check e-mail, do research—or sharpen their computer skills. All appreciate the help from knowledgeable staff who are always available when the center is open.

Our Friends Make It Happen

Funding for many Library programs comes from Friends membership dues and donations, its twice a year book sales, and the Mike Morrissey Charity Golf Tournaments which have raised approximately \$35,000 for the Friends since 2002.

Our book sale has grown in reputation among an increasingly large number of buyers—not the ordinary book lover who likes to browse through titles and linger over the opening pages. I'm referring to the "hunter-gatherers"—resellers, also known as dealers—who are on the hunt for books they can resell on the internet for five to ten times the sale price: \$1 for hardcovers, 50 cents for trade paperbacks.

Many dealers got into the business naturally, because of their love of books, which I expect most still have. But books have become merchandise now and the competition among dealers can be intense—while our sale opens at 10 a.m., many are in line at 8:30. The buying frenzy lasts about an hour.

Book buyers—most of us—who are not looking to resell their finds can get back to lingering at the tables to see what catches our attention, and though not intending to buy anything—after all, we have "too many unread books at home"—will still walk away with one or more we've been wanting to read and just cannot go home without.
