Graphic Novels More than Comic Books

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Several years ago, a local real estate agent passed out magnets to crowds gathered along the annual Takoma Park July 4th parade. The magnets listed five reasons why Takoma Park stands out; one of those reasons was the Takoma Park Maryland Library's graphic novel collection.

Indeed, the library has hundreds of graphic novels for all ages, and is known throughout the area for the breadth and depth of our collection. We also have large collections of manga, a type of Japanese graphic novel, for adults, teens and kids, plus a good-sized selection of books of comic strips, from "Peanuts" to "Zits."

Library Assistant Dave Burbank is the library's graphic novel "guru," the go-to guy when you want to know just about anything about graphic novels. Dave's knowledge is especially important when we have to decide whether a particular graphic novel belongs in the adult section, or if it could work for teens or even kids.



The decision can depend on a number of factors, including whether a book has realistic or cartoon-type violence, if it has rather pronounced body types (these are particularly prevalent in superhero graphic novels), if there is vulgar language, and just who might best enjoy the book.

Many readers remain unfamiliar with graphic novels, with some put off by the idea of "graphic" novel (they're just really longform comics, or stories told with a combination of words and pictures). Others don't like the idea of reading comics, or just don't enjoy "reading" illustrations. But many other readers love graphic novels, and the genre has skyrocketed in popularity over the past few years. Graphic novels aimed at kids are

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especially popular right now, and they are some of the most checked-out books in our library. Yet some parents wonder whether reading such "comic books" is good for their kids. We point them to research showing that graphic novels offer numerous benefits to readers, including helping to develop some key literacy skills. We have a handout for parents listing these benefits, and we also have a booklist of some of the best graphic novels for young readers—just ask us for these resources.

Recently, we've been seeing a number of adults —most of whom have never read a graphic novel —coming into the library and asking for *Can't We Talk About Something More Pleasant?*, a graphic novel

memoir for adults by Roz Chast. It's a remarkable book about how Chast, a single child, dealt with her parents' difficult final years, and it has struck a nerve with many baby boomers in the same situation. Chast's book is one of ten on the "long list" for the National Book Award's non-fiction prize, but perhaps more importantly than that, it's become a book that has inspired non-graphic novel readers to give the genre a try.

So, if you're ready to give graphic novels a try, our collection is a great place to start. And if you're already a fan of the genre, come dig into our terrific treasure trove.

Friends Great Big Book Club to Discuss Don Quixote

Catholic University Professor Bruno Damiani to Introduce the Novel, October 20 at 7:30pm

The *Ingenious Gentleman Don Quixote of* La Mancha is the Friends' Big Book for Fall 2014. Published in two volumes, 1605 and 1615, Miguel de Cervantes' great prose work is both a comic and sombre classic, the first of its kind—and a major influence on European and American novels until today. Don't take my word for it! Here, for example, is Flaubert, author of *Madame* Bovary: "You know that our first impressions are never erased. We carry our past within us, and we feed off it throughout our lifetime.... Whenever I analyze my own inner core, I always find the same thing: Don Quixote." And Dostoevsky: "There is nothing in life more powerful than this piece of fiction. It is still the final and the greatest expression of human thought, the most bitter irony that a human is capable of

expressing; and if the world came to an end and people were asked somewhere there: 'Well, did you understand anything about your life on earth and draw any conclusion from it?' A person could silently hand over *Don Quixote*. 'Here is my conclusion about life. Can you condemn me for it?' "And Mark Twain: "*Don Quixote* is one of the most exquisite books that was ever written, and to lose it from the world's literature would be as the wresting of a constellation from the symmetry and perfection of the firmament."

All are invited to join us to hear Professor Damiani on Oct. 20 and to drop in for the continuing discussions.

Programs for All Ages

We have a full slate of upcoming programs for all ages, many of them thanks to the generous support of our Friends of the Library.

Our trio of Fall/Winter "signature" programs—the ones that have become annual traditions for people of all ages—will be back, all of them funded by the Friends. First up, there's "Scary Stories," led by veteran storyteller Candace Wolf. The program will take place on Monday, Oct. 27 and this year there will be two sessions: 7-7:45 p.m. for ages 5-7, and 7:50-8:50 for ages 8-13.

Next is our annual visit from Eaglebear, a.k.a Tomas Shash, who brings family and friends each year to share their Xicano and Apache heritage with us. It's always a wonderfully interactive program for all ages, and we have families who come each year.

In addition to the wide variety of fall events described above, the Library will partner with Politics and Prose Bookstore to offer two programs with children's author-illustrators:

- Fri., Nov. 21 at 7:30 pm—Jon Scieszka, Tom Angleberger and Cece Bell.
- Sun., Nov. 23 at 1:00 p.m.—Caldecott Medalist, Jon Klassen.

The final signature program is the **Winter Solstice** celebration, which will be held this year on Thursday, Dec. 18. We'll begin at 6:30 p.m. with a drum circle led by master drummer Bill Jenkins, and then the Foggy Bottom Morris Men will swoop in at 7:30 with their songs, sticks and good cheer.

Other Friends-funded programs include: our popular monthly **LEGO Club** for ages 5-12; the monthly "Petites Chansons" (French Circle Time) for babies, toddlers and preschoolers; and the three "**College Bound**" events in October. Book-related events include the kick-off session—on Monday, Oct. 20 at 7:30 p.m.—of this fall's **Don Quixote discussion**, featuring professor Bruno Damiani, who teaches a course on Miguel De Cervantes' classic, as well as a Nov. 12 discussion of **Loitering With Intent** by Muriel Spark.

Looking Forward to a 21st. Century Library

This is a critical time to be a Library Friend — and to show your interest and support for the Library's future.

The Library is in the midst of an exciting space-planning initiative with a noted architectural firm and professional library space designers, The Lukmire Partnership. Principal architect Gregory Lukmire and designer Robin Puttock met with Library staff on September 23. Lukmire met with City Managers, and with community members in a public meeting on October 8. The public meeting, which will be re-broadcast on Takoma Park Cable Television, offered residents, who use their neighborhood Library and have an interest in its renovation and redesign, an opportunity to share their ideas for how they want it to evolve in the future.

Lukmire and associates will look at the options for significant renovation, and the

feasibility of adding space. They will offer several design possibilities, with opportunity for public review.

Built in 1955, the Library was last renovated in 1990, nearly a quarter century ago! The space-planning project is an outcome of the Needs Assessment the Library completed at the end of 2013. Among the findings, Library users asked for improved and enlarged space for many purposes: adult and kids' programs, reading materials, comfortable reading space, collaboration, Wi-Fi, and teen books and activities.
