Friends in Action

The current incarnation of the Friends of the Takoma Park Maryland Library was started in 1994. Early on, an ad-hoc committee of its members advocated for state funding for the Library — an effort that ultimately failed. They were successful, however, in securing Montgomery County's agreement to continue its 'in lieu of' payment to Takoma Park for Library service. These initiatives brought many City Library supporters together — and established the Friends as a savvy, hardworking and committed group of people who were eager to promote the Library and reinforce its role in the community.





Initiatives

The Friends purchased the first public Internet computers for the Library in 1995. This pilot project with Userful of Canada was a successful model of a turn-key system that continues in the Library's Computer Center to this day. Free e-books were first made available on the Library website as a test project by the Friends. Demand convinced the City to include this service at the Library.

A successful partnership with Columbia Union College (now Washington Adventist University) led to the Takoma Park

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The Friends support of Library programs and services include poetry readings, learning/craft activities, author visits, the afterhours book drop box, books for the after school program at the New Hampshire Recreation Center, and more. Funding

Established as a nonprofit, the Friends have established a primary role in fundraising for the Library — through memberships, book sales, and other events and efforts. A partnership with 'friends of Michael Morrissey' raised substantial donations to the Library from 2002 to 2011 through annual golf tournaments. Funds were also raised for several years with a silent auction. Personal checks sometimes simply arrive as gifts to support the Friends work for the Library.



A Record of Enrichment

Readings by local authors and journalists were originally held at the homes of Board members — and later at annual meetings at the Library. Special events have included an evening performance designed by resident artist Celeste Miller of the Liz Lerman Dance Exchange. She worked with Library staff and turned the Library into a venue for specially choreographed dances where staff members climbed book shelves, spun around poles, leaped over the circulation desk, and cavorted on tables.

Since 2005, we have enjoyed two successful book clubs. Outdoor poetry posters for Spring for Poetry Walk have been the result of a partnership with Montgomery College graphic design students. These are only a few of the many, many unique, community driven programs the Friends have initiated.

What a Library! And what Friends we have! As I consider the Friends' activities over the past 20 years, what strikes me more than the funds they raised for the Library — are the ways in which they stimulated our imaginations — thus expanding our reach and our capacity — revealing what was possible for a small, community library to accomplish. Through their foresight and energy the Friends have truly inspired us — and enabled us to realize our potential as a vital part of the Takoma Park community.

Spring for Poetry

Every Spring for the last decade, Carroll Avenue, our city parks and library, and the Community Center have blossomed with poetry — strikingly-designed posters that have become part of Takoma Park's cityscape. In a unique collaboration between the library's Friends and Department of Visual & Performing Arts at the Takoma Park campus of Montgomery College, second-year graphic arts students have been designing posters for poems. Selected by a committee of Takoma Park writers, the poems range widely and have included ancient Greek, Hebrew, and Islamic poets, nineteenth and twentieth century English language poets — from Emily Dickinson and Walt Whitman to Langston

Hughes, Naomi Shihab Nye, and Irish poet Seamus Heaney — and poems by Spanish, Russian, Italian, German, and Israeli poets. A great bounty — from spring until fall, Takoma Park becomes a garden of poetry.

Also on the website is a video that gives an inside look at the creation of the poetry walk, beginning with the selection of poems through the design process, including compelling interviews with student designers. 
Thanks to the Friends of the Library, our library is able to offer unique programs for young people. These programs — among the many the Friends support — include:

Summer Quest

Now in its second decade, the Summer Quest summer reading program is a "read-to-advance" game, with both art and a story created by Dave Burbank. We are the only library in the state to offer its own summer reading program, and more than 200 young readers participate each summer.

Spanish Circle Time program.

This weekly program, led by the energetic Senora Geiza, is so popular that we now are offering two sessions each Thursday morning to accommodate the crowds.



In addition, the Friends' support has allowed us to buy multiple copies of books that are used in our weekly **Early Literacy** programs on Wednesday mornings. Having everyone read the same book is an important way to help model best literacy practices for parents and caregivers.

The Friends also recently purchased books that were presented to English as a Second Language families at Takoma Park Elementary School as a way of welcoming them into our Library community. The book presentation was made as part of the Library's participation in a "Books & Breakfast" program at TPES for ESOL families.

Promoting reading, literacy, and literature is what the Friends are about.

While supporting a variety of Library programs for youth and teens, for more than ten years the Friends of the Library have also supported adult book clubs.

A bi-monthly discussion group has been meeting since 2005 reading books that have ranged widely over American and international literatures.

Beginning in 2009, the Big Book Group began taking on classics of world literature, one book each in spring and fall. Beginning with a lecture by a university professor, we meet three or four more times more — "a literary support group," one long time participant has said, for such

works as *War and Peace*, *Les Miserables*, *Don Quixote*, and James Joyce's *Ulysses*. (For the complete list of books the two groups have read, see http://ftpml.org/PDF/BooksReadSept2016.pdf)
