The Library and Computer Center staff would like to welcome everyone to our new



Status of Library Renovation

As I write this the week of Thanksgiving 2022, we are waiting for the very last permit domino to fall. Once that goes through, we have a contractor ready to break ground, and then hopefully 15-18 months later, we will have a new building! We are still planning on using any suitable timber from the trees to make fur-



niture that can be a lasting legacy of their presence on the site. We have salvaged the outfacing mural for inclusion in the final building.





We can provide a more detailed schedule once that last permit is issued, so stay tuned! What's happening to and with the trees!







Nearly all of the much-loved trees that grace the library's west yard will not survive the library renovation and are due to be cut down early in the process. One proposal to bring second lives to these trees is to have the wood milled for live-edged lumber. After drying, this lumber could be used to make library tables and other furniture. Visit the website of a Baltimore-based company (treeincarnation.com) for examples of projects using live-edged wood. This cost was included in the total project cost and is expected to be funded by the City of Takoma Park.


Reading Recommendations for the Holidays — by Ada Greenfield

Board Book (0-2) Guess How Much I Love You

A great book about love and caring for your littlest kids this year. Sweet illustrations and repetition will win the heart of anyone who reads this. Great for bedtime, these rabbits will win your heart this holiday season.



Easy Reader (3-5) *Good News, Bad News*

This book is super silly and easy to read, using only 3 words in the whole book. Kids will crack up at this story about an



optimist and a pessimist. As the story derails into more and more chaos the art gets more and more wacky. Kids will learn storytelling knowledge and repetition faster than you can say "Good news!"

Picture Book (6-8) The Great Lollipop Caper

Caper is sick of his acidity not being appreciated by the kids. He appeals in every way he can, but to no success. So he does the only other thing he can, and decides to sneak into the lollipop facto-



ry and sabotage the production... This goofy story will make adults laugh just as hard as the kids!

Graphic Novel (9-12)

Five Worlds Book 1: The Sand Warrior

For kids who loved Amulet, this will fulfill all their needs. Fantasy elements, gorgeous art, and characters you'll love through the end. It follows Oona, a young girl who is particularly unskilled at the art of sand



dancing. But when tragedy strikes, she and her new companions must go against everything against them to save the world.

Kevin is a sports columnist for *The Washington Post*, a visiting professor at the Philip Merrill College of Journalism at the University of Maryland, a panelist on ESPN's "*Around the Horn*," a sports roundtable television show, and a regular contributor to National Public Radio. Kevin has written thought-provoking columns and journal articles about the intersection of race, sports, and the media. A lively Q&A followed; the discussion ended only when the lights needed to be turned out for the evening. Kevin was willing to talk the night away!

BIG BOOK CLUB

The Friends of the Library's **Big Book Club (BBC)**—sometimes called the Great Big Book Club—was founded in 2009 to discuss great works of literature from the world written throughout history. After selecting a book, a scholar or expert on the author or the work presents a lecture about the book to BBC participants.

The BBC discusses a great book in the spring and fall of the year. Recent discussions have included *Vanity Fair* by William Makepeace Thackery and *Palace Walk* by Naguib Mahfouz.

For the fall of 2022, Big Book Club members chose *The Aeneid* by Virgil. The epic story of the Trojan hero Aeneas after the fall of Troy, *The Aeneid* tells how Aeneas eventually finds his way to Latium (present day Italy) by way of Carthage, and then successfully fights the native tribes to found Rome. It is considered a "foundational" work of the Western canon. The discussion was kicked off with a presentation by Dr. Charles McNelis of Georgetown University, introducing us to the story of Aeneas, his many struggles, and the beginnings of Rome. Turnout was pretty good: about 20 folks showed up at the Azelea room for the talk. Dr. McNelis gave a lively introduction to Virgil's Rome, the extent of Virgil's influence on Roman literature, and on the structures in the Aeneid that made it such an important part of Roman literature.

As is usual, the BBC follows up the general lecture with three focused discussions, held in the Hydrangea room of the Community

Center at 7:30 PM. The first was held on Nov. 2, covering the first four books of the poem. The second was on Nov 16, and the third and final meeting will be on Nov. 30.

Authors have included Kenzaburo Oe, W. G. Sebald, Chinua Achebe, and Mo Yan, as well as Mark Twain, Graham Greene, Willa Cather, Margaret Atwood, and Octavia E Butler.

The FBG meets every other month for discussions. In September the Friends Book Group discussed the 1993 novel, *The Parable of the Sower* by Octavia Butler. Foretelling a future of gated communities, unsolved disappearances, environmental collapse, and governmental failure, *The Parable of the Sower* depicts an Earth on the brink of apocalyptic disaster.


